## **Motor Homes**

There's plenty of space for Motor Homes at Poverty Bay GC, no need to book just turn up and stake your claim. The club rooms, changing rooms and showers at PBGC are available for your use when open.

Gisborne Park also offers a park for you motor home if you fancy somewhere different.

A NEW facility for NZMCA members has now opened and is yet another place you can park your motorhome. The site is across the road from the 17<sup>th</sup> green in Pacific Street and costs members \$3 pppn to pitch up.

## Walking/Cycling

The golf course is just across the road from the beach with the **Olympic Swimming Pool** a little further along Awapuni Road for those of you who like a chlorine bath at the beginning or end of the day. **Pepper's** restaurant is across the road from the pool, it's absolute beachfront and is a great place to dine as the sun sets over Nick's Head. There are a couple of sandwich bars within walking distance of the golf club and the World Famous, in Gisborne, **Smash Palace** is minutes away and handy for those who want to drink and not drive. It's worth a look.



For the more energetic golfer the popular and new beach front walkway/cycleway offers a pleasant alternative route to town.

Historic Nick's Head and Kaiti Hill along with the whole of Poverty Bay can be taken in as you enjoy warm evening temperatures whilst the sun sets over Poverty Bay on your way into town.

As you near town you will pass **Captain Morgan's** restaurant and **Top 10 Holiday Park.** A short detour along Grey Street will deliver you to the doors of the **Sunshine Brewery**, it's a popular watering hole for visitors in summer months. They have a

very attractive bar and deck for the tiring walker wanting to recover their breath. If you continue on up Grey Street you'll end up in the centre of town.

Returning to the walkway the next landmark is **Young Nicks Statue**, this is closely followed by the **James Cook Statue** which was erected as part of the millennium beautification of the City.



Further along your walk is the Three Rivers Medical Centre, The Warehouse, Noel Leeming, Poverty Bay Club, Harvey Norman, Court House and Cop Shop (try and stay away from the last two landmarks!) You're in the Port area now where all manner of eating and drinking opportunities await you.

First up is the **Rivers Bar** and restaurant, a popular place with older clients. Just over the Gladstone Road Bridge is a **Lone Star** franchise, the **Wharf Bar** and restaurant comes next. You're pretty close to the **Tatapouri Fishing Club** 



now, it's members only but if you are a fishing club member anywhere in NZ you're in. If not ask nicely and I'm sure a member will sign you in for the night.

Finally we come to the **Works** which is a comfortable place to end your day. If you still have some walking in you it's only a few minutes more to the **Cook Memorial** which should feature strongly in 2019's Sestercentennial celebrations.

From the golf course to the end of this trail will take you around 30 minutes at a brisk pace. The Tatapouri Fishing Club has a van which will take you home, otherwise a taxi will save your aching feet.
